Wednesday, February 3, 2016, 7:30 P.M.

"The 1918 Spanish Flu Pandemic - A Worldwide Perfect Storm" is the very interesting presentation for February 3th to be given by Dr. Charles Grossman, Professor of Biology, Xavier University. He will outline the origin in the United States of this erroneously named flu and describe how the disease traveled from America to Europe and back again in three waves. Philadelphia and our own Queen City were hit particularly hard with horrific loss of life. Even Downton Abbey marked a death from this flu.

Dr. Grossman's talk will feature pictures, local news clippings, detailed facts and figures as well as a broader look at this tragic event. As an expert in immunology, Grossman may also include discussion of other diseases and epidemics from both the past and present that impact our world. Did you know that even the bubonic plague has not been eradicated, just controlled?

Wednesday, March 2, 2016, Annual Dinner

48th Anniversary Annual Dinner Meeting Our yearly banquet meeting includes the election and installation of ATHS Officers and Trustees. "What's New at the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden (CZBG)?" will be the program. After dessert, we'll welcome our speaker: Zoo volunteer Fouad Ezra. Those who attended the March 2015 dinner will remember that Mr. Ezra presented the fascinating story of the founding of the Zoo in 1875 and how it grew into one of the finest zoos in the country. There have been many changes at the CZBG since its founding. This year Fouad Ezra focuses on what has been happening since 2000, with the opening of the Vanishing Giants and Lord of the Arctic exhibits, to the present day. The topics will start with the elephants, polar bears and giraffes, and advance to the three most recent exhibits: Night Hunters, Cat Canyon and Africa. You will hear the latest news about animals such as the lions, meerkats, birds from

Africa, black rhinos, African painted dogs, gorillas, red pandas, water pigs and Zoo babies. The Carl Lindner Center for the Conservation of Endangered Wildlife (CREW) will be highlighted. The Center is a state-of-the-art facility. It is staffed by internationally recognized scientists who are at the forefront of research dedicated to saving endangered plants and animals from extinction. The presentation will touch on the strategy to advance the Cincinnati Zoo and Botanical Garden as the greenest zoo in the country with the developments of LEED certified buildings, the Green Roof and the solar energy project. Don't miss this special evening.

The March 2, 2016 Annual Dinner will be held at the Receptions Banquet Center at 4459 Eastgate South Drive. The doors will open at 6:00 p.m.; dinner is served at 6:30 p.m. ATHS booklets will be for sale, and there will be photos and other items on display. "Who Killed the Lindbergh Baby? Unmasking the Crime of the Century." When their first child was kidnapped from their home in 1932 and found murdered in the woods, Charles and Ann Lindbergh were the most famous couple in America, and the case would become the most publicized crime of the 20th century. Eventually suspect Bruno Richard Hauptmann was convicted and executed for killing "Baby Charlie." But this did nothing to halt the questions and controversies that still surround the case 80 years later.

Become an armchair detective in this interactive presentation by **JT Townsend**, local author of *Queen City Gothic* and *Queen City Notorious*, as he takes a fresh look at the Lindbergh Kidnapping. Townsend uses photographs he took in the Lindbergh house in Hopewell, NJ, archival images from 1932, forensics and psychological profiling to lace the evidence into a shockingly rational theory that could close the book on this famous crime.

President's Message

Welcome to 2016 and everything good that goes with it. I'd like to send you a few comments on the past year's accomplishments and some random thoughts on what we might accomplish in 2016.

2015 ATHS was enriched in the past year by many physical activities. For the Log House, we finished the enclosed porch project with interior painting, a new ceiling, and new lighting. The windows and shutters were repaired and painted and the soffits improved to prevent invasion by "critters." The enclosed porch display was redesigned to highlight our collection on household utensils and tools. The four windows in the original log house were also repaired and painted, laying the ground for many more years of life.

The brick house underwent some needed maintenance. The 1983 roof and gutters were replaced in August to eliminate a flooding problem in the house. Fresh paint was applied to some of the exterior of the house to improve the overall appearance of the house.

We also finished the 2014 project to improve the Annex (formerly known as the summer kitchen). The floor was painted and a new display of 1900s farm implements was organized. In the process, improvements were made to allow better conversion of the space into a kitchen for Country Store weekend.

The grounds around the Log House on Clough Pike were constantly modified to improve appearance while retaining an appropriate setting. The grounds of the upper property on Bartels Road received only necessary attention including replacement of part of the roof of the small white house on Bartels Road and the repair of a supporting porch column on the Browne House.

In addition to the various physical activities, we continued to have very successful May Plant Sales and the September Country Store. We also continued our "History to Schools" programs for the second-graders of Anderson Township in the spring and our Open Houses at both the Log House and the History Room at Anderson Center.

2016 We have plans for 2016 in several areas. The Log House interior will be rearranged to include the two excellent corner cupboards we received in 2015. We also plan to "freshen" the other existing displays in the Log House, possibly including surveying implements to honor Ichabod Benton Miller, builder of the original log house. These activities will occur on a fairly tight schedule because we now plan to open the Log House starting in April rather than in June.

The grounds around the Log House on Clough Pike should show other changes as we continue to wrestle with the Log House pathways and hope to continue the repainting of the exterior of the brick house.

The other structures on our property continue to be a concern. Both barns need cleaning and repairs to ensure their continued existence. The smaller structures on the Bartels Road property continue to deteriorate and need resolution. Finally, both the small white house on Bartels Road and the Browne House have serious deficiencies.

All-in-all, 2016 should be a lot of fun. If we are to accomplish even a part of our plans, we will need the continued support of our members. In order to strengthen our organization, we will be reaching out to our members for support, not with money but with their time. We also plan to work harder at gaining and utilizing new members. It isn't a secret that we are all growing older and need a lot of new and somewhat younger members to continue our efforts at the Anderson Township Historical Society.

Remembering Ichabod Benton Miller

Surveyor Ichabod Benton Miller, builder of the ATHS Log House, was born in New Jersey in 1764. He began his journey to "Kaintucky" on October 4, 1789 and kept a journal, noting travel conditions along the way. He reached Limestone (Maysville) on November 18th after the "fatigunest time I ever saw." He visited the small settlements along the Ohio River throughout 1790-1791, often returning to Columbia. Notes from his diary include:

1792 January 10th: Married Sarah Mercer

1792 April 16th: Moved from Columbia to Mercersburg (Newtown)

1792 Aug 23rd: Moved from the station (back to Columbia)

1792 Last of November: very sick.

1792 November 16th: David Mercer Miller born And

1795 February 13th: Moved from Columbia to my own place

(Diary entries from the Rev. John Shane collection.) In 1793 Miller surveyed a 600-acre parcel that ran between the Little Miami River and Clough Creek Valley. Miller purchased 440 acres of this parcel, stretching north of Clough Creek in a deed dated April 2, 1796, 220 years ago. He had already built his log house on that land along Clough Creek. He paid \$0.50 an acre for the 440 acres. Ichabod and Sarah Miller had seven more children.

Miller was a Justice of the Peace in Anderson Township and county commissioner 1799 to 1802. He was chosen a state representative in 1803. He surveyed many roads in the area.

The inscription reads: "In memory of Ichabod Benton Miller, one of the Pioneers of the West. Born in New Jersey A.D. 1764. Died in Ohio A.D. 1839. Aged 75 years. After a career of usefulness his end was peace with this World and hope in that which is to come."

In the December 26, 1839 issue of *Liberty Hall and Cincinnati Gazette*, the obituary of Ichabod Benton Miller described him as being "familiar to many of

our citizens with whom he was in habit of frequent intercourse;" his history and character were generally known. He was born in New Jersey September 20, 1764. "He came out to Kentucky as one of Symmes' surveyors and in the following year in March, entered upon his duties in Columbia. . . . He entered into the views of those who thought they were founding a new empire in the back woods and who were governed by enlarged ideas of its future greatness. . . . Few men were more striking in their appearance, firm in their purpose, faultless in their habits, and intelligent and preserving in all the duties of life. None could behold, none could know him without the conviction that he was a man whose nobility was certified by Nature and Truth. Peace to his remains."

Log House Gardens and Grounds Update

The beautiful plants surrounding the Log House need care and maintenance. It is not an easy task for one or two people but it would be a lot easier if several people put forth the effort to maintain the grounds. Nancy Krueger, Diane Schneider and I have been mostly responsible for maintaining the present grounds but we need your help.

As Yard Chair, I need assistance that is why I am asking for your help. One big project is the **replacement of the rock walkways** which we are planning to have done this spring. The walkways have become a walking hazard and need to be changed to something more suitable and less hazardous. We will need volunteers to help get the grounds back into good condition for the events of scheduled for the spring season. We hope to begin gardening in April.

The **Annual ATHS Plant Sale** is scheduled for Saturday, May 14, 2016. Volunteers are needed to donate plants, pot plants and sell plants. Last year we raised \$4,164 through the ATHS May Plant Sale to help ATHS with its various projects.

Another event coming up in the late spring is the **Anderson Township Garden Tour** on Sunday, June 5. We have been asked to participate as one of the stops on the tour and need help to get the yard and gardens around the Log House ready.

I want to make a plea for assistance, whether you can help yourself or know someone or an organization or school group who needs a worthwhile project. To me, preserving our history is a great project! Also, we need some volunteers to refinish our wooden "punch benches" and to install a vintage mailbox (originally used by the Leuser family) near the parking lot so that we can use it as place to distribute membership brochures, flyers for various activities, and other hand-outs. Adopt a Roadway/Road Cleanups in 2016
