
Wednesday, February 7, 2018



President's Message

It's no secret. What makes the Anderson Township Historical Society a great organization is dedication from our membership, member donations and our terrific volunteers. In all groups there are those who are blessed with certain skills, talents and gifts. Many help with managing our funds, serving on the Board, working in our gardens and on other property issues, participating in our meetings and programs, volunteering for the Country Store and plant sale and a host of other valuable and needed services.

In the last year we recognized the need to stabilize our barn near the Log House. A number of people looked into this, including members of the Property Committee and a variety of contractors and engineers. We are getting closer to taking action to hopefully make this structure last for many more decades. **Don Perry** is to the point where we now have our professionally-drawn plans and we are still looking into any required permits and getting a contractor to give us a price. But in order for the work to begin the Board decided we needed to clean out several areas of the barn so work could begin. We picked November 18th and luckily our volunteers showed up on a very pleasant day temperature wise.

I believe all of us were very happy with the progress we made as we cleared out many old pieces of furniture, old rusty shelving, previously termite-infested piles of wood and removed many cobwebs and swept the place clean, We restacked all tables and put all wagons back in the barn and finished up with a very large pile of items out on the curb. Many items were taken by metal scrappers and other scavengers (I say this in a nice way as we wanted these items removed to avoid having to pay Rumpke for removing them.)

So the barn is looking much more organized and ready to have a contractor get started soon. Once the stabilization project is completed we will make needed repairs to the roof and gutters and drainage issues to take water away from the barn. We may whitewash the barn interior (as it had been previously) and then decide how to display and label items to include the barn into our Sunday Open Houses.

Lou Trent and Bill Dreyer had gone to the barn in the preceding days to attempt to identify what could be discarded, saved or moved to another location. As usual with a group of people there was some discussion as to what had to be saved or thrown away, and we worked through it. Those hardworking members who assisted in this project were Lou Trent, Bill Dreyer, Lyn Scheper, Kenny Burck, Bob King, John Roos, Diane Schneider, Doug Magee and George Scheper. We all left with a feeling of accomplishment and progress. On November 4th another group of hardly volunteers with many of those named above along with Ann King, Nancy Krueger and Debbie Ruehlman worked to cut down much of the dead vegetation around the lower property preparing everything for the spring. If I missed any name of volunteers in my list, PLEASE let me know. Thanks again to all of you.

An election of new officers and two trustees will be voted upon at our Annual Dinner meeting on March 7, 2018. Many are running again for the same positions but we probably will have a few openings. Let me know if you have an interest in running. As previously reported we are in need of a Recording Secretary as this position has been open for some time. Linda Magee has been graciously staying on until a volunteer comes forward.

Janet Heywood, Don Perry and I met with Anderson Township officials and other Township residents on ways to celebrate the 225th anniversary of the Township in 2018. We plan to tie some our events such as the Country Store into the Township plan. There has been some discussion of bringing back the spring Tea Party event our Society held for a few years in the past.

We had a delightful Christmas program at our December meeting. Singers from Anderson High School performed (and they made the rest of sing also) but they were very happy to eat the many cookies and other Christmas goodies we provided for them.

Clough Pike Barn Issues

As outlined in the last *Surveyor*, we have a number of issues with the Clough Pike barn that **will** result in the loss of the structure if they are not corrected. These include water damage and structural issues. We are currently working on several fronts to tackle and solve these problems.

Quotations have been obtained to add gutters, downspouts and improved grading on the west side of the barn to reduce the water damage. Also included is a recoating of the metal roof of the barn. Before these repairs can proceed, we need to join the lean-to section of the roof on the east side of the barn to the main barn structure in a better way to remove a serious safety situation. How best to make this repair is currently being considered.

The other structural issues are more complex and costly in nature. A structural engineer has made recommendations and architectural drawings have been prepared. After approval by the structural engineer, obtaining a building permit and solicitation of costs are the next step. This portion of the project has become more costly because it was decided that rather than fix only the west side of the barn we should make the entire barn structure safe. We hope to present a proposal and motion to the members at the Annual Meeting in March.

These barn repairs are probably the largest and most complex project for ATHS in many years. I believe it approximates the complexity and scale of the log replacement project at the Log House several years ago. We will need the support of many of our members to monitor the project and perform secondary tasks required of the project such as landscaping, painting, and clean-up. More information will be provided as we work our way through the project.

ATHS Garden Group Update

The grounds around the Log House are looking better and better, the result of many hours of work by the ATHS Garden Group. My project this winter is to print out the genus & species names for the plants in the gardens and put them on the plant labels come spring. [I learned the purpose of using the genus & species names (Latin) while taking the Master Gardener class this fall.] Including myself, we now have six Master Gardeners in our Garden Group.

Looking towards spring we need to prepare for the May Plant Sale of Perennials. This year the sale will be held on May 12, the day before Mother's Day. Depending on the weather and how the plants grow, we may have an advance sale of the early spring plants (daffodils, aconites, etc.) Please let us know if you have any plants to donate to the ATHS Plant Sale or for Log House yard. And also please call us if you would like to help us pot plants in preparation for the Plant Sale. Spring is a very busy time for the Garden Group. Just remember that "many hands make light work."

We are saddened to report that long-time life member Lynn A. Bellamy died on October 14, 2017, at age 88. Lynn and his late wife Ruth Bellamy were active volunteers for many years and both served as Trustees on the ATHS Board. The wood gate in the fence on the west side of the Log House was made by Master Carpenter Lynn Bellamy in 2007.

Some members may remember **Clifford Reeder**, who was active in the Anderson Township Historical Society and served as a Trustee in the mid-1980s. We recently learned that he passed away on June 26, 2017, at age 96. A long-time resident of Mt. Washington, he was an expert wood carver. In recent years, the former Marine and veteran of World War II carved canes for wounded veterans. Among the vintage ornaments in the ATHS collection are two beautiful birds carved by Mr. Reeder.

Adopt a Roadway/Road Cleanup 2018

The Historical Society has joined forces with Anderson Township and continues to participate in the "Adopt a Highway" program. We are helping to keep roads and areas litter free. 2018 will be the seventh year for the Society to participate in the program. We are responsible for keeping clean both sides of Bartels Road from Newtown Road to Clough Pike and Clough in front of the Log House to Royalgreen. The Township supplies gloves, bags, vests and T shirts, and pickup tools for our use. The bags of trash are left at the roadside and the Township picks them up. The Township will provide liability release forms for each participant. There is a sign in front of our parking lot which gives us recognition for our work.
