Anderson Adopt a Roadway - Our third cleanup day was made easier by leafless shrubbery. We could easily see and reach the trash that we had missed over the summer. We finished fairly quickly, posed for a picture and departed. Kenny Burck, Bill Dreyer, Ann King, Brenda Greer, Kathy Hoelscher, Linda Scheper and Sue Wettstein participated. The Spring Cleanup will begin Saturday, April 20 at 9 a.m. Please plan to help clean up the roadway or the Log House grounds to prepare for tours in starting in May.

Township plans for Anderson Trail sidewalks on Clough Pike are moving forward with bids going out this summer and work starting on the section between Hunley and Bartels roads late in 2013 and finishing in 2014. A few surveyor stakes popped up last week. This project will include a new, wider culvert under the road at our creek. Bill Dreyer and Don Perry are negotiating various details impacting ATHS. The Township will move and restore our signs, fence, flag pole, etc. upon completion of the work. The construction will, at times, block access to our property and shut down Clough as well. Let us be as patient as we can be during construction.

Don Perry made two visits to the Hamilton County Courthouse with regard to the break-in at the Log House in September. The primary accused pled guilty and will be charged with restitution costs and sentencing (if any) later this year. Another perpetrator has not had a court date.


Election of Officers and Trustees



Log House -- A Closer Look



Details of the architectural drawings of the Log House prepared by Richard Shade, August 27, 1976, drawn at a scale of ¼ inch = 1 foot. The Log House reaches a height of 17 feet 11 inches at roof top and has exterior dimensions of 20 feet 2 inches in width and 40 feet 4 inches in overall length. The interior of the oldest section (front room) is 18 feet 8 inches side to side and 16 feet 2 inches front to back.

the manv hills Township Anderson provided days of winter fun. This sled resembles ones seen in newspaper advertisements in the early 1940s but we don't know the origin or date on this sled. It has long wooden runners that resemble skis.


Pierce's Memorandum and Account Book

Among the fascinating items collected by Stephen Smalley from Anderson Township families is this 140-year-old account book. The pocket-sized softcover book was a promotional item produced by R. V. Pierce, M.D. of Buffalo, NY. Dr. Pierce sold a wide variety of family medicines that were advertised throughout the booklet. The right-hand side pages provided space for the user to track their expenses. In the front are calendar pages for 1873 and 1874. The complete title explains that book is "A Present from the People's Medical Servant R. V. Pierce, M.D." and is "designed for Farmers, Mechanics and ALL PEOPLE who appreciate the value of keeping a memorandum of business transactions, daily event and items of interest or importance, for future reference."

The book is completely filled with the careful notes of expenses for the year 1877 and the first months of 1878. There is no indication of who filled out the book but we can read the details of their life from the money they spent. The very first entry is generous "Jan 1, 1877 -- candy for children \$ 0.08." Most of the items are food items, for example, 1 sack of salt \$0.10; 1 lb crackers \$0.10; 1/4 lb tea \$0.25; 1 lb butter \$0.30; 4 lbs of beef \$0.40; 2 lbs of lard \$0.30; 4 lbs of coffee \$1.00; and 25 eggs \$0.25. Also mentioned are "Jan. 8, 2 postal cards \$0.02; May 4, 2 pr socks \$0.40; Oct. 12, coat & pants, \$9.50." The most costly items recorded for the year were "Jan 6, 2 kinds of coal, \$30.29" and "Oct. 12, insurance paid \$50." Overall, expenses of \$316.62 were tallied for the year 1877.

Inside back page of Pierce's Memorandum and Account Book (1873). This device for irrigating the nasal passages seems very much like the notion of the Neti Pot that is so popular now days.

Dr. Pierce's "Golden Medical Discovery" was a cure for the unpleasant but common condition called Catarrh. Dr. Pierce offered a standing reward of \$500 for a case of Catarrh which he could not cure with Dr. Sage's Catarrh Remedy applied with Dr. Pierce's Nasal Douche. The two medicines with the instrument cost \$2.00. Catarrh is a term once used to describe the inflammation of the mucous membranes associated with the common cold, coughs or infections of the adenoids, middle ear or tonsils. It results in mucus discharges, phlegm and blockages -- all uncomfortable and often chronic. We still don't have a cure for common cold but antibiotics help us recover from bacterial infections.

History Room News: "Anderson on the Move" Exhibit and Stone Frog

Come visit the History Room this winter. We have a new special exhibit of several dozen photographs from the ATHS collections that illustrate "Anderson on the Move: Horses, Trains, Trucks and Cars." The permanent wall displays, of course, have many illustrations that depict Anderson families and their vehicles. This winter display includes more of these striking images showing how life has changed over the last century. The History Room is open: Sunday and Wednesday afternoons, 1 to 4 p.m., and Tuesday evenings, 6 to 8:45 p.m. at Anderson Center, 7850 Five Mile Road, Lower Level.

Also new is the addition of a cast of the Turpin Stone Frog Pipe. The plaster cast is a gift from the Cincinnati Museum Center to the History Room. The stone pipe was discovered by the Turpins in the mound that was once between the original Philip Turpin brick house and Route 32. In the early 1900s plaster casts were made from the stone original. The original stayed in the Turpin family and we have a newspaper clipping from the 1925



Cincinnati Times Star with Mrs. Laura Turpin (1847-1931) holding the stone frog. By the 1940s the location of the original was not known to those in the scientific community and some people thought it was lost. In recent years the original was found and is now at the Museum Center. It is an oversized

American Bullfrog, carefully crafted with a cavity for the tobacco and a hole for a pipe stem at the rear. It is thought it was used in community observances.

Photo from 1908 taken on Beechmont near today's intersection with Wolfangel. Notice the tracks of the Interurban Railway and Terminal Company line that ran along Beechmont from 1902 - 1918. The IRT provided passenger and light freight service into the city that was much needed in the days before the wide-spread availability of automobiles and trucks.

Come learn more about the fascinating history of Anderson Township through photos, hands-on exhibits and artifacts. ATHS provides the docents for the History Room and we can always use additional docents. If being a docent is of interest to you, please contact Bill Dreyer (474-0568).
