# President's Message - Plant Sale, Country Store, Sidewalks & Sympathy: Oh My!

Plant Sale: Thanks to Jan Hawkins and her stalwart crew of helpers, the May Plant Sale again topped the three thousand mark with sales of \$3,254 at last count. People really are in the market for "home dug" perennials, trees, etc. Unfortunately, Jan has announced that she will help but no longer chair this successful spring event. Please step forward if you are willing to take over this very important and successful fund raiser in 2014. There will be plenty of experienced help.

Country Store: I am delighted that Don Perry, VP, has accepted the Country Store Chair and plans are moving right along with most of our standard departments and chairs. The musical groups have been booked, and we will have two major raffle prizes this year with the choice of: Dinner for Eight at the Log House or a Township Quilt (created by Sharon Perry). Both items have strong appeal, with the Basket of Goodies rounding out the additional raffle prize.

Anderson Trails: The next two years will be one of many changes to our property, primarily the addition of a sidewalk on both Clough Pike and Bartels Road. All of the area stakeholders have signed easement agreements with the Township. Preliminary bids and work moving poles, etc. will begin this year; sidewalks will go in next year. Obviously, the Clough portion will have the biggest impact on the Log House and Brick House properties. At times, it may be a challenge to traffic and negotiate one-lane construction equipment, but neither the Country Store nor the Plant Sale will be impeded. You may have noticed that many plants along the front fence have been removed. A few were sold at the plant sale, and others have been "heeled in" to save for replanting at the Log House. The project is complete. Thanks to the many gardeners who worked especially hard this year to save as many old fashioned plants as possible. Unfortunately, our main sign will be down throughout the construction and we will lose our trees shading the parking lot. The Board is thinking about new options to replace the old hedge, which required trimming several times a year. We have offers of reclaimed split-rail fencing and assistance with replanting/landscaping from local businesses.

# **History to Schools Program**

The second graders from all six Forest Hills Elementary Schools spent a day at Anderson Center during the period April 26 through May 6. The students learned about township government and planning from Trustee Peggy Reis and the township staff; safety services from members of the Anderson Fire and Rescue squad and Hamilton County Sheriff's department; the natural history of the nearby ponds from Suzanne Clingman, Greenspace inspector, and local history from ATHS volunteers.

Society volunteers presented "Then and Now in History." Don Perry gave a power point show that told the stories of his ancestors: the James Clark family who traveled to Anderson Township by flatboat in 1797



and the Gottfried Wolfangel family who came from Germany in 1855 and traveled by steamboat up the Mississippi and Ohio rivers.



The students also toured the History Room. They were by the areeted "school teachers" who pointed out some highlights of displays and the compared public schools then and now. The kids really enjoyed sitting at

the old school desks, writing on chalk boards and reading the replicas of McGuffey Readers.

The students were invited to visit the Log House during the regular Open Houses this summer and each student received a "History Challenge" homework assignment brochure. Pictures of eleven buildings in Anderson Township were shown both as "Then" and "Now." Students and their families could drive by these buildings and compare the pictures of "Then" to "Now." In late May certificates of completion were given to those students who had had the opportunity to complete the challenge.

### **History Room News**

A special exhibit of the artwork of Betty Martin is on display at the History Room June through 2013. August Betty Martin was a student at Cincinnati Academy in the 1940s. This exhibit offers a striking view of original illustrations of clothes and household objects of the 1940s and brings back memories of the styles popular then. It



illustrates themes such as dresses, furs, accessories, lingerie, swimsuits, faces and household items and shows how concepts were developed into actual newspaper advertisements.

Betty Steves Martin (1922-2013) graduated from Withrow High School in 1940. In 1944, she enlisted in the United States Marine Corps and served for two years. After her service in the Marine Corps, she attended the Cincinnati Art Academy. During art school and for a year following graduation, she created commercial illustrations for J. C. Penney and Alms & Doepke that were published in the newspapers. In 1949 Betty married Robert Martin; they were the parents of four children. Betty devoted the rest of her life to her family. They lived on Mt. Carmel Road in Anderson Township. We are very grateful to Betty Martin's family for loaning this exhibit to the History Room.
