Community Support for the Urban Farm

Community support continues to make a difference at the Urban Farm. R.W. Aufderheide & Son, Tree Removal Experts, continues to supply us with wood chips. We use cardboard covered with wood chips for an effective weed barrier on our paths and around the perimeter of the gardens. Last fall as the garden season ended, Roger Mason of Mason Grounds Management volunteered his services and blew out the water lines in preparation for winter. During the Covid shutdown, Danny Creelman constructed four raised beds as his Eagle Scout project. These raised beds enable those with limited mobility to garden. Two additional raised beds have been constructed by Matt Leopard and his son, Luke. Kevin and Bryan Creelman placed and filled the new boxes. They also secured our portalet so it won't blow over again! This month, H. Hafner and Sons, Inc. donated 25 yards of leaf mold compost. This compost can be worked into the soil as an amendment, or used around vegetables and perennials as mulch. The support of the Urban Farm by the community is one of the most gratifying aspects of the Urban Farm. We thank one and all.

Creek Erosion Issues

In late February, the Properties Committee discovered that a large portion of the eastern bank of the creek running behind the lower barn had collapsed. It was reported that the damage had to have occurred in February because the bank was intact at the beginning of the month. An engineer has estimated that about 180 feet of the east bank needs to be stabilized and an additional 60-100 feet of the west bank also needs attention. Additional slippage could endanger first the barn and then the corn crib and outhouse. The slippage line is within about 2-1/2 feet of the foundation of the lower barn. The barn was stabilized in 2018 with large piers and beams to support the structure. New slippage could undercut the piers and result in collapse of the barn.

Background - Erosion is a long-term concern dating from at least August of 1992 as noted in the Surveyor. The creek channel was deepened and straightened by Hamilton County Maintenance about October 1992. The Motz family built a long retaining wall before April 1999 and in late 2001, they installed five tons of boulders to stabilize the retaining blocks in the creek. In 2012-2013, a larger culvert

was installed under Clough Pike. Finally, in 2016, additional rubble from demolished sheds on the upper property was added to the eastern bank behind the corn crib.


Current Actions - We are currently looking for answers from several directions.
Insurance, County responsibility, and

grants are being investigated. Civil Solutions is preparing a scope of work document to be used to obtain more permanent solutions. We are also requesting proposals from contractors for actions to give us shorter term protection.

The erosion area has been covered with tarps and we will be monitoring/documenting the area to attempt to measure additional slippage.




Next Steps - Our next steps will be determined by analysis of the cost of long-term or short-term solutions compared with the historic value of the buildings. We are estimating that Engineering alone will cost over \$10,000. The actual cost of long-term remediation could easily be in the range of what ATHS paid for the upper properties. This will not be an easy decision.



Anderson Township Historical Society and Urban Farm "Looking to the Future – Strategic Planning Process"



As the Historical Society and Urban Farm looks to the future, a group of members began meeting last November to build out a strategic plan. The purpose of this process is to assist with long term planning around activities that will continue to strengthen the organization's ties to the community and assist in fundraising efforts. Using the mission statement of the society as a guide, the group has participated in a series of activities and discussions. Beginning with a Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities and Threats (SWOT) exercise, the group was able to surface nearly fifty key topics for further review and synthesis.



These initial conversations led to a series of discussions around analyzing and prioritizing the topics identified in the SWOT analysis. The result is a series of "Pillars" that will be used to guide the development of annual goals for the organization.

The chart below depicts the key pillars and the initiative within each pillar.



In the coming months the group will build out goals and action plans for achieving the initiatives set forth. In doing so, we will look to broaden the involvement of the membership to draw on expertise, interest and knowledge of others.

Archaeological Dig Returns This Summer



The Miami Valley Recollections and Reconnections Project, led by Dr Robert Cook and Dr Aaron Comstock, will return to Anderson Township this summer to continue their archaeology study at the Turpin site on SR 32 near Clough Pike. The study will run from May 14th to June 12th. Their team will be based at the Urban Farm, where they will clean and sort artifacts. They will be housed in the Browne House and the Knights of Columbus Hall.

During this time their team will continue excavating the Turpin site. Visitors are welcome to witness the processes used to dig within a defined area. Two sites will be involved: the Ancients area originally excavated by Harvard University

in 1885, and an historic foundation that has been traced to the original Turpin Family.

There are initial plans for sorting demonstrations at the Anderson Center and an educational discussion and demonstration as part of our Summer Events Series. The Historical Society believes this is a wonderful opportunity to combine the discoveries of the Ancients dig with our own Anderson Township history beginning in 1796!



National Collegiate Competition - Ben Gressle

During the week of March 13-18, 2023, one of our members, Ben Gressle traveled to Starkville, Mississippi to participate in the 47th Annual National Collegiate Landscape Competition (NCLC). This annual event, hosted by the National Association of Landscape Professionals (NALP) is an event where up to 60 colleges and universities at a time will come together and engage in academic competitive events intended to demonstrate students' skills in various

activities in the landscape industry.

Ben's competitive events were "Business Management" and "Safety First". These events consisted of taking a written exam in the financial and personnel matters of a landscape business operation and exercising proper safety protocols on a job site and around vehicles, equipment, and chemicals respectively. There were also many other events present that other students competed in as well.

Ben competed for his school, Cincinnati State Community and Technical College, which came in 4th place overall at the competition. This ranking matched the school's ranking from 2019 in which they competed in Denver at Colorado State University. Many of the school's individual students placed in their specific events as well.

In addition, the competition featured many professional networking opportunities and

workshops such as a national career fair featuring industry employers from all across the US.

Overall, Ben had a positive experience at the competition and on the trip and made meaningful long-distance friendships with individuals from other schools elsewhere in the country which was one of his favorite parts of the competition.

Ben competed in the same competition last year in which he traveled to Raleigh, North Carolina. In this previous competition, Ben competed in the same events and placed very highly. Cincinnati State placed

5th overall in the competition in 2022 making the 2023 #4 ranking better than the last one.

In addition, many of the longdistance friends were people that Ben had initially met at the competition in 2022 and he remained in touch with them since then.

Ben is a student in Cincinnati State's Landscape Horticulture associate's degree program. He is anticipating graduation from the program on May 6th, 2023 with his Associates of Applied Business in Landscape Horticulture. A commencement ceremony will be held the following day on May 7th. He will be transferring to the University of Cincinnati's College of Design, Art, Architecture, and Planning this fall to continue his horticulture education and work towards a bachelor's degree. As a result, this was Ben's final time competing in the NCLC.

Ben is also currently working on his final project with Cincinnati State which involves identifying and cataloguing the woody tree and shrub specimens on the ATHS Log House and Bartels Rd. properties and is receiving guidance from David Vogel as he moves along with this project.

Lesley, along with her son Ben, also spent time organizing and creating an area for people interested in genealogy or local newspaper research in the upstairs of the Brick House.

Lesley hopes to continue adding to the digital archive and posting vintage images to our Facebook Page. We are still uncovering treasures at the Brick House and enjoy sharing them with the community.

Melanie Woodworth

Melanie graduated from Beloit College, where she majored in anthropology, and worked at the Logan Museum as a student. She did archaeological work at the Cahokia site in Illinois, and in the Kentucky/Indiana area. She



returned to Wisconsin to attend graduate school at the UW-Madison and then worked for the UW-Center for Climatic Research more than thirty years until retirement.

Upon retirement, Melanie became very involved with the Oregon Area Historical Society in Wisconsin. In 2006, she began volunteering, became a board member, and eventually became the Museum Coordinator. She coordinated the Arcadia book on Oregon, Wisconsin published in 2017.

Interest in genealogy led to Melanie compiling family history booklets on all her Finnish lines, and her husband Doug's German and New England ancestors.

She and Doug moved to Cincinnati in September 2021 to be closer to their daughter and family, who live in Anderson Township. Granddaughter, Ellie, assured grandma Melanie -- "they have an historical society here and they even have a log house!" So, at the plant sale in spring of 2022, Melanie asked about volunteering. Bob King pointed to Charlie Wallace and said, "go talk to him." It did not take long to get involved.

Focusing on the activities at the Brick House, there is now a "Tuesday Crew" volunteering from 10-2 weekly. Melanie is working to get all accessions up to date. Also, major efforts are underway to get all the collections organized and labeled, properly preserved and easier to find.

She wants to work on some small displays. Not just to have interesting stuff, but to tell the interesting background story.

Our new volunteer has discovered that the ATHS has wonderful collections of genealogical material, newspapers, and local history. She credits the many people who have worked very hard in the past and says we are building on their efforts. Our goal is to make the community of Anderson Township more aware of these resources.

The History of "History to Schools"

In 2013 Don Perry wanted to share the History Room with children in the township. Three teachers and a township official met with Don. From that discussion came a day-long field trip to the Town Center for second graders in Forest Hills School District and third graders from IHM school. Presentations and schedules have been tweaked to make this a day enjoyed by all for seven years. Covid cancelled 2020, 2021, and 2022, but we're back!

The students experience four sessions during their visit. The urban planner describes how Anderson Township has changed over time emphasizing each elementary school and the surrounding neighborhood. Students locate their home on an aerial view map. The naturalist guides the kids on a nature walk around the Town Center past the grove of native Ohio trees and the pond looking for tadpoles or ducklings. Students participate in a bike rodeo, learning safety rules from township police, firefighters, and paramedics. The volunteers from ATHS depict a day in a one-room schoolhouse with a lesson

from a McGuffey Reader. The scholars are guided around the displays in the history room. They encourage discussion of the items depicting "then" and "now". The antique waffle iron from the log house is similar to a waffle iron used today except for the electric cord.

This year 525 second graders, 22 teachers and many parent chaperones will attend History to Schools. Each student will receive a membership brochure to ATHS. Hopefully families will return to the history room again, or pay a visit to the log house or urban farm. Perhaps some will join ATHS, or at least support our efforts.
