

### Grant Awarded from OHIO HISTORY CONNECTION

Exciting news! The ATHS is one of fourteen recipients of a generous \$19,000 grant from the Ohio History Connection. On March 15, 2024 representatives of the OHC presented the "Big Check" to gathered members of the ATHS to kickstart the repair and restoration of both the chimney and firebox of the Miller-Leuser Log House.

The funds are earmarked to help restore both the exterior and interior of the chimney of our flagship log house that is on the National Register of Historic Places. Built in 1796 the chimney has witnessed plenty of local history, but is in need of critical and historically appropriate repairs. This general award will partially fund the process and allow for the iconic chimney to stand for decades to come. #### Kathy Hoelscher: A Dedicated Steward of History

Kathy's journey with the Browne house began in 1943, when she moved in at the tender age of four. The house became her home for the next 16 years, witnessing her grow from a child to a young woman ready to start her own family. After her marriage in 1958, the house remained in the family until 1998, when it was sold to the historical society following her stepmother's passing.

Kathy's connection to the house didn't end there. In 2007, she rejoined the society, reigniting her passion for its history. Partnering with her husband, Jim, they embarked on a project to document the society's history through a book, *Historical Book of the Society*. It was a project that spanned from 2009 to 2014. Kathy's thorough approach



extended beyond writing, as she meticulously captured every important event through photographs.

That same year, 2007, Kathy's dedication extended beyond the written word and pictures. She began volunteering in the society's genealogy room, delving into the past of countless families. Her passion wasn't

limited to the indoors; she also took on the task of maintaining the society's beautiful gardens and property.

Kathy's commitment was further recognized in 2021 when she became a valued member of the society's board. In recent years, she has focused her efforts on the historical society's administration, painstakingly archiving its treasures.


Beyond her official roles, Kathy has also been a friendly face for countless children during the days of the country store. She engaged them in activities from pumpkin and slate painting to, remarkably, even digging up the slate itself. Kathy's resourceful and kind spirit has enriched the society in countless ways.

Janet's dedication to the program and care of the flock has led to its continued success and to the enjoyment of so many in our community. The program relies on her expertise and commitment, and we thank her for all she does!

Janet Quilligan has been a volunteer at the Anderson Urban Farm since its inception over five years ago. She might be spotted tending her garden plot that she shares with her husband Dave, who also happens to be an active volunteer for the farm and the Anderson Township Historical Society. Janet enjoys the outdoors more than just about anything, and the Urban Farm allows her to enjoy and share the natural history of our area.

After growing up roaming the swamps of northern Florida she pursued a biology degree in college. After



When her son came along, Janet took some time off to be a full-time mom, but later returned as an adjunct professor in the UC



veterinary technology program. She also found a part-time gig as a farmer at an educational farm in northern Kentucky called Sunrock Farm. Sunrock Farm hosted scores of visitors over decades, including students from all of the Forest Hills elementary schools. Field trips to the farm demonstrated where our food comes from. Activities ranged from gathering eggs and holding baby chicks, to milking goats, brushing horses and observing tadpoles in the water troughs.

Upon retirement, the Urban Farm came to be, and Janet was thrilled when Mercer teacher Erinn Cox hatched the Chicken Program. Janet helps oversee the husbandry of the Urban Farm flock and gladly shares them with anyone who will listen.

The society voted to have a metal handrail installed leading from the side of the house to the porch of the ATHS Research Center (Red Brick House). That eventually will become the main entrance to the Research Center. The railing should be installed sometime this spring. Doorbells have been installed at all three doors.

Another project completed was repair of the main plumbing

line of the Farmhouse (Browne House). We received a great deal from Midwestern Plumbing for this repair. The repairs were necessary for when the archeology team stays in the house this summer while they are working on the Turpin Dig off of State Route 32 near Clough Pike. We are also fixing up the kitchen for possible future activities.


## Log House Area Gardening

About 1822, a 15-year-old named John H. Robinson (the first of the four John Robinsons) ran away from his home in South Carolina and joined "the circus", starting with small wagon shows as a workman, then a stilt walker, bareback rider or manager at larger circuses. In April of 1842, he left the Ludlow & Smith circus to form the *Great Robinson Circus* with partner Joseph Foster. In 1850, while performing in Northern Kentucky, John H decided to "winter" in Cincinnati and Terrace Park became the permanent home for the next generations of the Robinson Circus. # Clay Pipes Made at Point Pleasant, Ohio (c. 1840's - 1890)

The ATHS has a collection of clay pipes, donated by Elsie Smalley in 1979. It is likely that a collector gave this set of tobacco pipes to Stephen Smalley, the local historian. The pipes are probably defective ones discarded before sale, since they are all missing stems.

In the past, numerous tobacco pipes were recovered from the pottery factory waste dump located at the mouth of Old Indian Creek off the Ohio River. This Point Pleasant site has been totally disturbed by treasure hunters and dealers digging for pipes. B. Thomas and Richard Burnett were collectors and published a paper in 1972. Parker Melvin, also a collector, was reported to have unearthed more than 1,000 clay pipes from this site.



These were trade pipes – Point Pleasant pipes have been recovered from several places. One Pt. Pleasant pipe was found in the remains of the Cairo, a Union gunboat sunk in the

Yazoo River near Vicksburg. Pipes were also found at Fort Union, New Mexico, and from Fort Laramie, Wyoming.

The Point Pleasant factory was located at an ideal spot. The property contained access to good pot making clay, water, and convenient river transportation.

There were several owners of the pottery factory. William P. Lakin is credited with building the pottery. He died in 1843, and Cornwall E. Kirkpatrick purchased the Sarah Lakin property.



Kirkpatrick relocated from his pot making business at Covington, Kentucky, to nearby Point Pleasant, Ohio, in 1849. The purchase included the William Lakin pottery and a most famous one-room cabin, the birthplace of Ulysses S. Grant in 1822.

Nathan Davis rebuilt the pottery after it burned in a fire. He is found in the Titus 1870 Atlas of Clermont, County.

George, Henry and James Peterson purchased the plant in 1874. In 1880 they made smoke pipes, stove-flues, and drain tiles. Pottery operations seem to have operated until the 1913 flood.

The Cornwall Elihu Kirkpatrick pottery site is today referred to as the LKDP (Lakin, Kirkpatrick, Davis, Peterson Brothers) Pottery site at Point Pleasant, Ohio.

There are ten general pipe designs, but numerous variations. One example in our collection is the "Point Pleasant Indian."

One of our ATHS members, Nancy Krueger, related that her children spent many summer days searching for pipes and to their joy, occasionally found one!

### Community Garden 5th Anniversary



On a chilly March 23rd, the annual Spring Brunch was held in the Urban Farm barn for the Community Garden's farmers. It was quite the event. Returning farmers met again after what felt like a long winter, and new farmers were welcomed. This year the celebration had an extra spark: it is the fifth anniversary of the Community Garden! A lot has happened these last five years.

The story of the Community Garden began in 2018 with the decision by the ATHS to develop the upper property and rent garden plots. The property was cleared of invasive plants and the driveway was improved. In early 2019 the garden area was plowed and divided into 36 5'x20' plots. Water lines were run from the barn's cistern to the garden and a pump was installed. The first vegetables were planted in spring of 2019.

In 2020 COVID was in full swing, and many people clamored to grow their own food. We decided to clear an additional area and expand the garden to 76 plots, and added deer and rodent fencing. The Community Garden was truly a place of refuge for people during this time.

All along, the Anderson Township community has supported the Community Garden. For example, leaves are provided by Landers Landscaping, compost by Hafner & Sons, and wood chips by R.W.

Aufderheide & Son. Accessible raised beds were constructed by Danny Creelman as his Eagle Scout project. In turn, the farmers support the community by delivering produce and flowers to people who are not able to get out.





Who knew in 2019 that more than crops would grow? Working together has created a strong community among the farmers. What will the next five years bring?


### Annual Dues Will Soon Be Due!
