

Music On The Farm Summer Series



PROPERTY COMMITTEE

The Property Committee has installed a metal hand railing leading up the walkway to the Research Center (Red Brick House). Our current project is upgrading the Equipment Shed (Annex Building) by repairing the barn side doors and removing the sink. Next we will be working on the ceiling and repairing the back door. Currently in this building there is a tool display, a stoneware pottery display and a viewing area featuring a video about the area and the Log House. A future project is to repair the lightning rods and cables on the Upper Barn; we feel that this is a safety concern.

This summer George Scheper and I have been daily watering the American Beech tree at the Urban Farm because of the drought. This tree species has many surface roots as well as below-ground roots; water has been very critical to help this tree survive. It is important that we protect these roots so we continue to have this beautiful specimen that was planted in 1946 by Kathy Browne Hoelscher and her father, Joseph Browne. S

Belle Ayer Philhower (1874-1961)

The Research Center discovers many interesting and unique items as we continue to organize.

One such item is a painted box lid from a Shaker cheese box. Inside was the penciled name – Belle Ayer, painted 1892. Belle would have been eighteen years old.

An additional box of Philhower/Ayers materials was found containing photos and another painted item – a tambourine.

Also discovered was a painter's palette. Although we have not been able to substantiate the owner, we believe it is Belle's palette.

A search on Ancestry.com discovered another of Belle's paintings from 1902 of Mt. Moriah Church. This painting was owned by Roger L. Ludlow, a relative of the family, whose photo is among the discovered materials.

Who was Belle? She was the daughter of John Ayer and Mary Elizabeth Griffin, and was born 1874 in Clermont County. Belle married John E. Philhower in 1908. They had one daughter Elizabeth, who was a teacher in Terrace Park.

Now the challenge is to identify photographs.

As you may know, the Log House has stood since 1796 as a testament to our area's rich heritage, offering visitors a glimpse into the past and serving as a hub for local history and culture. However, we recently discovered that the chimney, an essential component of the building's structure and function, is in urgent need of repair.

Due to the efforts of a dedicated team of volunteers, we have received a grant from the Ohio History Connection for \$19,000 to help cover a portion of the repairs. This is great news! However, the total cost of this project will be significant.


